That would be just the beginning though, with staying in love the real challenge.

My wife and I met and soon fell in love even though she didn't much like me at first. We got married quickly and came to know each other. Now over 50 years later, having raised five children and holding various jobs, with busy church engagements when young, we still love each other just as much. Love can prevail independently of circumstances and true love will.

However, when the name of my lover is Jesus Christ, how will that fit into my life? Love offers many shades of experience and with Jesus my feelings are quite different from those towards my wife. I often just sit and reflect before Jesus, who enables towards change and loves me always the same. I do not seek for the church to solve my problems. Church is the place where I may learn and celebrate what Christianity involves, which cannot ever make me a real Christian. Only Jesus does so, personally. My love relationship is not with church but with the Lord.

The reason for this brief reflection on love is simple: *love is the power able to best sustain someone in an uncertain world and it will do so person to person – or Person.* Circumstances will not prevail against it. As a Christian, I should practise charity towards all, but that real sense of being truly loved is exclusive to my family and Christ. Church cannot make that happen for me and may even become a hindrance. I must take love seriously, also the love of God, and see it overflow towards my family.
